# EVERY CROSS IN OUR CHRISTIAN LIFE IS A SIGN OF GOD'S GLORY

"Life is not a bed of Roses! Every day brings its own "Problems or Crosses"; these Cross are often perceived as a symbol of suffering and sacrifice, and they hold a profound significance in our Catholic faith. It represents the ultimate act of love and redemption, where Jesus Christ, the Son of God, willingly endured crucifixion for the salvation of humanity. The Cross is not just a reminder of Christ's sacrifice but also a powerful symbol of God's glory, manifesting in the lives of believers through trials, tribulations and triumphs.

In Christian theology, the Cross is central to the narrative of salvation. It signifies the intercession of God's justice and mercy, where penalty for sin is paid by Jesus Christ, allowing humanity to be reconciled with God. The Cross is a testament to God's profound love for humanity as expressed in Jn.3,16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life."

The concept of God's glory is multifaceted encompassing His majesty, power, and presence. In the context of the Cross, God's glory is revealed through the paradox of strength in weakness. The Cross demonstrates that God's power is not always manifested in worldly success or triumph but often in the midst of suffering and adversity. This paradox is beautifully captured in 2 Cor 12, 9 where Paul writes "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore, the Cross becomes a symbol of God's glory, not despite the suffering, but because of the redemptive power and love it represents.

For Christians, the Cross is just not an historical event but a present reality that shapes their lives. Bearing one's Cross, as Jesus teaches in Lk.9,23, "If you want to come with me, you must forget yourself, take up your cross every day, and follow me." This means embracing a life of self-denial and sacrifice for the sake of the Gospel. This call to discipleship is not without its challenges, but it is through these very challenges that God's glory is revealed. In Rom 5,3-4 "We boast of our troubles, because we know that trouble produces endurance, endurance brings God's approval, and his approval creates hope." Thus, the Cross in the lives of believers is a sign of God's Glory, ransforming them into the image of Christ.

The Cross has a transformative power in the lives of believers. It reminds them that their struggles and sufferings are not in vain but are part of a larger narrative of redemption. In 2 Cor 4,7-9 "Yet we who have this spiritual treasure are like common clay pots, in order to show that the supreme power belongs to God, not to us. We are often troubled, but not crushed; sometimes in doubt, but never in despair; there are many enemies, but we are never without a friend: and though badly hurt at times, we are not destroyed." This passage highlights the tension between suffering and glory emphasizing that even in the midst of trials, God's glory, is at work, sustaining and transforming believers.

The Cross, far from being merely a symbol of suffering, is a proud sign of God's glory in Christian life. It represents the depth of God's love, the power of redemption and the transformative journey of believers. Through the Cross, God's glory is revealed in the lives of those who follow Christ, manifested in their perseverance, character and hope. As Christians embrace their Crosses and follow in the footsteps of Jesus, they participate in the glory of God, reflecting His love and redemption to a world in need of hope and salvation. The Cross therefore stands as a powerful testament to the enduring presence and transformative power of God's glory in the lives of believers.

# THE THREE ARCHANGELS

The Church celebrates the importance and significance of the three archangels found in the Scriptures on 29<sup>th</sup> September, each having a different mission.

#### St. Michael

The name in Hebrew means, "who is like God." He is the leader of all angels and of the army of God. He is the Prince of the heavenly host. Saint Michael has four main responsibilities: to combat satan, to escort the faithful to heaven at their hour of death, to be the special patron of the Holy Church, to call everyone from their life on earth to their heavenly judgement.

He is mentioned several times in the scriptures. He is first mentioned in the book of Daniel, where he is called, "one of the chief Prince" (Dan 10,13). In the book of Jude, he is specifically called as archangel. The book of Revelation speaks of the defeat of satan by Saint Michael and His angels. (Rev 12, 7-9). In each reference, Saint Michael is acknowledged as a warrior Saint, who battles evil as well as chief angel responsible for other angels.

He is the patron Saint of grocers, soldiers, doctors, mariners and police. He is also held to be the special Guardian Angel of the Pope.

#### St. Gabriel

The name Gabriel in Hebrew means, "the power of God." He is one of the seven angels to stand before God. He serves as a messenger of God to certain people.

He is mentioned in both Old and New Testament of the Bible. In the Old Testament, he appears to the prophet Daniel to explain the vision of the Rams and foretold the fall of the Persian Empire at the hands of Alexander the Great (Dan 8). In the New Testament, he appears to Zacharias in the temple and announces to him the birth of John the Baptist (Lk 1, 11-25). He is also the angel of Annunciation, who informes Mary that she has been chosen to become the mother of the Saviour (Lk 1, 26-38). Christian traditions also attributes to Gabriel the message given to the shepherds at Bethlehem, (Lk 2, 8-20) and to Joseph in connection with the flight into Egypt (Mt 2, 13-23) and also believed that it was he who strengthen Our Lord in the garden of olives on the night of His betrayal (Lk 22, 43-44).

In 1951, Pope Pius XII proclaimed him the patron of

telecommunication work, radio, broadcasters, postal work and messengers.

### St. Raphael.

The name Raphael in Hebrew means, "God has healed." He is one of the seven angels who always stand before the throne of the Lord and one of the only three mentioned by name in the Bible.

In the Old Testament, we find how he cured the blindness of Tobit (Tobit 11) and acted as a guide during his son's trip to Media. The New Testament makes a mention of an angel who used to come down at certain intervals to stir the water in the Probatica pool, which caused the cure of the infirmity, who descended into the moving water (Jn 5, 1-9).

He is patron Saint of the travellers, blind people, nurses, pharmacists, physicians and the people who are ill.

#### Conclusion

# THE CROSS: WHY IT BECAME THE CHURCH'S CENTRAL SYMBOL

Standing on the pinnacle of every Church and Chapel draws humanity to God



Billy Graham a prominent Christian American Evangelist once said 'Come to the Cross, this gospel is for every one'.

The Cross! So familiar to us, from the wall crucifixes in the houses, at the altars, inside the Churches, to jewellery, to Church steeple toppers, to paintings; perhaps we take the Cross for granted, assuming that it has always been there and not always very conscious of the fact that it depicts Christ suffering and a violent, humiliating, and excruciating death.

Well, just as it did to me, now this might come as surprise to many of you. According to

Robin M. Jensen-the Patrick O'Brien Professor of Theology at the University Of Notre Dame, 'Visual depictions of the cross and crucifixion are rare before the sixth century and initially refer to Christ's triumph and glory rather than his suffering and death'.

Research and findings have shown that both the Cross and the Crucifix are missing from early Christian culture, art and artifacts until at least the late 4th century and probably not very common until 6th to 8th century. Now this seems to be puzzling, isn't it?

However scholars have tried to explain this lack, this ostensibly missing image in variety of ways, some even suggesting that Christ's death was not particularly central to Christian theology. They would have liked the Good Shepherd and nice, happy Jesus. But Prof. Robin Jensen says that she had studied at least enough Church history and theology to know that absolutely wasn't true. The Cross and Jesus' death on the cross is profoundly embedded in Christian teaching from the very beginning at least from the writings of apostle Paul.

Prof Robin says Paul's letters also to the Galatians is even more important for his developing a theology around the Cross, what it heant, and why Jesus was crucified. The famous saying of St. Paul "I

will preach nothing except Christ crucified," indeed puts to rest the idea that Christians didn't give much value to this story of Christ's death on the Cross. They did. But in ancient Rome, dying on a cross was horrible, the ultimate punishment for acting against the State. Early Christians did not want to see their Saviour Jesus humiliated on the Cross. So they presented him as a good shepherd in their art. Like fish on an anchor, a plough or a ship's mast which could look a lot like a Cross, also figure of man, stands erect and can stretch out his hands, this exhibits precisely the nuance of the Cross.

The first surviving image "Sarcophagus of the Cross," common only after the 4th century. It depicts Jesus holding a cross, sceptre of power, kind of triumphant, glorious symbol.

Historian have long assumed that the first appearance of the Cross in Christian art was connected to the first Christian Emperor Constantine around 312. He had a vision before a major battle against his enemy Maxentius. He saw a flaming cross in the sky (Heaven) with the words

"IN HOC SIGNO VINCES-IN THIS SIGN YOU WILL WIN." So he ordered to place a symbol or logo, like that of a Cross on the shields, the helmets and the standards of his army of his troops, an imperial emblem of military conquest and take them into the battle, very famous battle, the turning point for Christian history. He won this battle, became an emperor, legalised Christianity, became a Christian because of God's patronage in this moment, giving Constantine this great victory over his enemy.

Though disputed, it is also said that around the year 324 or 325, Constantine's mother, Helena is said to have pursued his son the Emperor to search the Cross and she discovered the True Cross at the site of Golgotha in Jerusalem. Thus the paintings and statues of St. Helena holding the cross.

The High Middle Ages, the 13th and 14th centuries is associated, very clearly with the developing devotion to the cross, that begins with the Cistercians but particularly gets developed with St. Francis and his stigmata and then the Dominicans and then the others.

After having travelled back in time, having understood the journey of

the first appearance of the Cross after the death of Jesus, we have another side to look at; the written text, the biblical manuscripts, the connection of the three; **God-Jesus-Man** and the Cross used as a prop meant to stand as a symbol, supposed to remind us of something that would have otherwise been fearfully dreadful to mankind if not for the ransom sacrifice of our creator-God's only begotten son Jesus, planned by God himself to take human form to save mankind.

And it is the Cross that walked with Jesus to mount Calvary, held Jesus, saw blood of Jesus dripping down from his crown of

thorns, flesh torn apart; it is the Cross that felt the agony, the pain, the suffering, the humiliation that Jesus experienced while he hanged onto it for almost 3 hours. The Cross too endured the same excruciating pain as the nails pierced into it's woody flesh.

It is the Cross that witnessed in that moment of death of Jesus, 'Agape (ἀγάπη) Love' that God and Jesus have for Humanity. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" John 3,16. and "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friend" John 15,12-13 where Jesus lays down his life for us, sets us free.

Indeed, through his life (body) Jesus forms the Church and through his death on the Cross (blood) he clears off the debt called sin. **The Church and the Cross** are both like **Jesus and his Shadow**. Wherever the Church stands, wherever it goes the Cross follows. Making the Cross a fitting symbol of Catholic faith, standing on the pinnacle of every Church and every Chapel.

That is why every Cross we see is a reminder of God's 'Agape Love.' A reminder that we are set free, a reminder that we are stakeholders of everlasting life. A reminder that the Cross and the Resurrection of Christ offers forgiveness of sins, it offers a New Life and Renewed Hope and that we should love one another as God Loved us.

# MOTHER CLAUDINE ECHERNIER: A CATALYST FOR LEARNING IN THE SILENCE OF UNREAD PAGES

#### **Humble Beginnings**

Born on May 29, 1801, in the modest Parish of Feternes, modern day South-East France, Claudine Echernier came into a world marked by poverty and hardship. Her parents, Francois Echernier and Anne Dutruel, were devout but impoverished, raising nine children in a tiny cottage with wooden floors and meagre land. Four of her siblings died young, and the eldest, Claudine was sent to work as a shepherdess at the tender age of ten.



Despite the harshness of her environment, Claudine possessed an **astonishing thirst for knowledge** and a deep spiritual sensibility. Her early life was not shaped by formal schooling but by the raw realities of survival and service. Yet, it was precisely in this crucible of adversity that her character was forged.

### The Spark of Literacy

Claudine's journey into literacy began in an unlikely place: the fields. While working as a shepherdess, she encountered a young lady who recognized Claudine's eagerness to learn. This compassionate mentor taught her to read fluently in a short span of time. It was a transformative moment—not just for Claudine, but for the countless lives she would later touch.

Her self-driven education continued as she matured. At age 15, after the death of her mother, Claudine took on the responsibility of caring for her siblings. She learned the art of sewing from Miss Poncet, a skilled seamstress, and became proficient in cutting and stitching. These skills not only sustained her family but later became tools for empowerment of young girls.

# **Trials That Tempered Her Spirit**

Life did not spare Claudine from further trials. To help the family financially, her father, lured into smuggling salt and tobacco, (then contraband goods), was imprisoned for several years. Claudine, then became the head of the household, shouldering the emotional and financial needs of her siblings. Her resilience during these years was nothing short of heroic.

After her father's release and remarriage, Claudine then 26, was free to

pursue her interests. She entered the service of the parish priest of Feternes, who had been appointed to Chavanod. Her life in Chavanod was marked by **piety, humility, and charity**, and she quickly became known for her exemplary conduct. Seeing the moral plight of the young girls in the parish, she took it upon herself to teach themreading and Christian values which were lacking in the village of Chavanod. Her kitchen became the classroom and it was well accepted and supported by the Parish Priest.

### Founding the Sisters of the Cross of Chavanod

In **1838**, Claudine co-founded the *Congregation of the Sisters of the Cross of Chavanod* with Fr. Peter Marie Mermier. The mission was clear: to serve young girls, especially those who were poor and disadvantaged. Claudine's own experience with illiteracy and her miraculous journey to literacy made her uniquely equipped to understand the transformative power of education. She believed that **education was liberation**, and she dedicated her life to uplift others from the darkness of ignorance and became a catalyst of learning. Her Congregation became a sanctuary for girls who had been denied the right to learn. Through teaching, mentoring, and spiritual guidance, Claudine and her sisters became agents of change.

#### A Teacher in Spirit and Action

September, a month dedicated to teachers, is the perfect time to honor Claudine Echernier—not just as a religious founder, but as a **teacher of the heart**. She taught not only reading and writing but also **dignity, resilience, and faith**. Her classrooms were not confined to buildings; they extended to homes, fields, and hearts.

Her legacy lives on in the thousands of Sisters of the Cross who continue her mission across the globe. They carry forward her vision of **education as a sacred duty**, especially for the marginalized.

### Legacy of Literacy and Love

Claudine Echernier passed away in the early hours of 10 August **1869**, but her spirit endures. Her life the adage that **one need not be born into privilege to become a teacher**. She rose from illiteracy to become a founder, educator, and spiritual guide. Her story reminds us that the most powerful lessons often come from those who have walked through the fire.

#### She lives on...

In a world still grappling with educational inequality, Claudine's life offers a timeless lesson: **Empowerment begins with literacy, and literacy begins with love**. As we celebrate teachers this September, let us remember Claudine Echernier—a woman who taught with her life, her heart, and her unwavering faith.

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# **ALL ABOUT DIGITAL ARREST**

"Digital arrest" refers to a fraudulent tactic where scammers impersonate law enforcement officials (like police, CBI, or Customs) through phone calls, video calls, and fake documents to extort money from victims by falsely claiming they are under arrest or facing serious charges. It is a scam, not a legal process, designed to instill panic and coerce victims into paying money or providing personal information to avoid supposed legal action.

#### How it Works

#### 1. Initial Contact:

The scam begins with a call or message from someone claiming to be from a government agency like the police, CBI, or a customs department.

#### 2. False Accusations:

The victim is accused of serious crimes, such as money laundering, cybercrime, or drug trafficking, often linked to a parcel or a supposed online transaction.

#### 3. Fake Evidence:

To build credibility, scammers send fake official documents, doctored videos, or screenshots, creating a convincing but false narrative of their alleged involvement in a criminal activity.

# 4. Imposing Fear and Urgency:

Victims are threatened with immediate arrest, the freezing of their bank accounts, or passport cancellation, and are pressured to act quickly without verifying the claims.

#### 5. Coercion and Demands:

The scammer uses intimidation to make the victim switch to a video call, sometimes even setting up a fake "police station" backdrop, and demand "fine" or "security deposit" via digital payment methods like UPI or crypto currency to resolve the issue.

# 6. Disappearance:

Once the victim transfers money, the scammers vanish, and the victim realizes they have been defrauded after trying to contact real authorities.

What to do if you encounter a Digital Arrest Scam

- **Do not panic.** Maintain composure and do not fall for the pressure to act immediately.
- Verify the claim: By contacting the actual authorities through their official phone numbers or by visiting a police station.

- **Do not share personal or financial information**: Or make any payments to the scammers.
- Report the incident: To the relevant police and cybercrime authorities, "digital arrest" has no legitimate advantages; its primary impact is negative, with serious disadvantages for victim and the "advantages" are only to the perpetrators.

### **Disadvantages for victims**

- **Significant financial loss**: Victims can be defrauded of enormous sums of money, sometimes their life savings, through coerced digital transfers via UPI, crypto currency, or fake bank accounts.
- Severe emotional and psychological distress: The scammers use intimidation, fear, and sustained pressure to isolate victims and cause intense stress and anxiety, sometimes leading to tragic consequences.
- Identity theft and misuse of data: Victims are tricked into revealing sensitive personal data (e.g., Aadhaar, PAN, bank details) which scammers use for further crimes, including opening fraudulent accounts.
- Erosion of trust: The scam damages victims' trust in official institutions, the digital ecosystem, and even their ability to make rational decisions.

## Challenges in combating digital arrest scams in India

- **Technological sophistication**: Scammers use advanced techniques like caller ID spoofing, deep fakes, AI voice modulation, and fake official documents to appear more credible.
- Cross-border operations: A significant number of these scams originate from other countries, particularly in Southeast Asia.

  This makes tracing perpetrators and prosecuting them extremely difficult due to jurisdictional complexities and limited international cooperation.
- Low awareness and social stigma: Many victims, including highly educated professionals, are unaware that "digital arrest" is a myth. The fear of social stigma and embarrassment also prevents victims from reporting the crime, allowing scammers to operate with impunity.
- Data vulnerabilities: Leaks of personal data from various websites provide scammers with the information they need to create convincing narratives, giving them a crucial first step in committing the fraud.
- Organised criminal networks: These scams are not isolated neidents but are run by sophisticated, organized syndicates with

multiple layers of middlemen, making it hard to target the masterminds.

#### Way forward to mitigate digital arrest scams

- 1. Public awareness and education: Launch widespread public awareness campaigns across various media platforms (digital, print, radio, metro stations) to inform citizens, particularly vulnerable groups, that legitimate authorities never conduct "digital arrests" or demand money over the phone.
- **2. Increased international cooperation**: Enhance collaboration with other nations to develop standardized protocols for data sharing and extradition. Target scam hubs in countries like Cambodia and Myanmar to prosecute criminals operating beyond India's borders.
- 3. Technological countermeasures:
- Advanced fraud detection: Banks and financial institutions should use advanced analytics and AI to detect fraudulent patterns, especially unusual, high-value transactions, and alert authorities.
- **Telecom blocking**: The government, in cooperation with telecom service providers, must continue to block spoofed international calls that appear to originate from Indian numbers.
- Strengthened cyber security: Promote best practices for digital safety, such as using strong passwords and two-factor authentication, to protect against identity and data theft.

# Robust reporting and tracking mechanisms:

- **Simplify reporting**: Ensure victims can easily report incidents through the National Cyber Crime Reporting Portal (cybercrime.gov.in) and the national helpline (1930).
- Fast-track response: Encourage immediate reporting to financial institutions to freeze funds before they can be withdrawn or laundered into untraceable assets.

# Legal and institutional strengthening:

- Evolve legal frameworks: While existing laws can be applied, expanding the legal framework to specifically address the evolving tactics of digital arrest scams would help close loopholes and streamline prosecution.
- **Protect personal data**: Implement robust data protection frameworks, such as the Digital Personal Data Protection Act, 2023, to hold organizations accountable for data leaks that enable these scams.
